Award 1 mark for the correct word circled.

The house next to ours which belongs to Mrs Green, is for sale.

Q3.

Award 1 mark for the correct word encircled.

When Mum saw that I was wearing Oliver's gloves, she wanted to know where mine were.

Q4.

Award 1 mark for the correct possessive pronoun inserted into each sentence.

That bike belongs to me. That bike is *mine*.

This house is owned by us. This house is *ours*.

These video games belong to my brother. These games are *his*.

Q5.

Award 1 mark for a correctly punctuated sentence using the active, i.e.

- *The children will sing a song.*

Also accept:

- *The children will be singing a song.*

Do not accept misspellings of verb forms or errors in punctuation or capitalisation.

Award 1 mark for a correctly punctuated sentence using the active, for example:

Bill fed the dog.

Also accept:

Bill was feeding the dog.

- *Vegetables were grown.*

- *The fence was damaged by wind.*
- *The fence was damaged.*

Also accept

- *The fence got damaged by (the) wind.*
- *The fence got damaged.*

Do not accept a change to the verb or tense, e.g.

- *The fence is damaged.*
- *The fence was destroyed.*

Do not accept misspellings of verb forms.
